

#### Title I School-Parent/Guardian Compact

#### **School Responsibilities**

Franklin Towne Charter High School will:

- 1. Provide high-quality curriculum and instruction in a supportive and effective learning environment that enables the participating children to meet the State's student academic achievement standards as follows:
  - Our program will be centered on the absolute mastery in the core areas of reading, mathematics, science, and social studies.
  - We will use high-interest, standards-aligned, and research-based curriculum materials.
  - Graduates will be prepared academically to enter any University.
  - FTCHS will cultivate among its students the social and emotional skills necessary to be productive beyond our walls.
  - FTCHS will implement interventions as needed to ensure that students have the tools and support needed to succeed in the FTCHS curriculum and beyond.
  - Students with special needs will be supported through an exceptional Special Education program, enabling these students to meet the goals of their Individualized Education Plans (IEPs).
  - FTCHS will celebrate multiculturalism, providing students with cultural experiences both inside and outside of the classroom.
  - Student learning will be augmented with a comprehensive extracurricular program that includes clubs and teams that emphasize arts, athletics, community service, leadership, and academics.
  - FTCHS will employ a dedicated and highly qualified instructional staff.
  - Instructional staff will receive relevant and high-quality professional development rooted in best practices.
  - FTCHS will employ data-driven decision making, using a system of continuous monitoring of student progress.
  - FTCHS will fully integrate technology into all areas of the FTCHS educational environment.

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- Parent/guardians will be actively engaged in their children's education and will be active participants in a variety of academic and extracurricular programming at FTCHS.
- FTCHS will be a safe learning community, providing a clear and consistently implemented Code of Conduct for student behavior.
- 2. Provide parent/guardians with frequent reports on their children's progress. Specifically, the school will provide four report cards in addition to ongoing communication with parent/guardians via the school's online grading system PowerSchool (an internet-based academic monitoring system that provides parent/guardians with daily access to their children's grades and assignments).
- 3. Provide parent/guardians reasonable access to staff. Specifically, staff will be available for consultation with parent/guardians as follows upon appointment by calling the Main Office at 215-289-5000 and via FTCHS email. In addition, Franklin Towne will provide each teacher with a voicemail system that parent/guardians can contact 24 hours a day.
- 4. Provide parent/guardians opportunities to volunteer and participate in school functions and events. Parent/guardians are strongly encouraged to provide 20 hours of service to the school each year. - 5. Involve parent/guardians in the planning, review, and improvement of the school's parental involvement policy, in an organized, ongoing, and timely way.

Hold an annual meeting to inform parent/guardians of the school's participation in Title I, Part A programs, and to explain the Title I, Part A requirements, and the right of parent/guardians to be involved in Title I, Part A programs.
